CHANCE FOR BREAKTHROUGH

Coming off a thrilling victory on a rain-soaked field on Saturday, South Carolina moves on to a significant test with Texas A&M coming to town.

A&M remains unranked, but has the type of team that could be by year's end, taking Clemson down to the wire and suffering its other loss this season to an absolutely elite Alabama squad. In two games against the most quality opponents to date this season, South Carolina has not performed well, dropping contests to Georgia and Kentucky.

The Aggies will bring a lot of talent to Williams-Brice Stadium as the Gamecocks look to notch their first SEC victory over the program. Last week's contest against Missouri produced plenty of talk about the Gamecocks' quarterback play as Jake Bentley sat due to injury and Michael Scarnecchia turned in a clutch performance. All indications are that Bentley is back, but he's far from the only one that will need a good performance on Saturday.

A&M's bread and butter is running the ball and stopping the run, two areas with which USC has struggled this season. As well, the Gamecocks will have to play the team's most complete game of the year in order to win. We'll cover more of the keys and important players in the pages to come.

This one, if USC could pull it off, would be an important win.



Let's use the eye test: how close in talent is this Gamecock team to Texas A&M?

That's a tough question. Texas
A&M is clearly the more talented
team on paper and the Aggies
have more built-in depth than the
Gamecocks due to a history of top
recruiting classes under Kevin
Sumlin. That said, these players
were recruited for a different
scheme than the one they're
playing in; South Carolina has
played the Aggies close for the last
two season and is only a 2-point
underdog this week.

Clearly, Carolina's first group has been able to match up with A&M's first group. Throw in the fact that this isn't expected to be a game played in sweltering heat and that A&M isn't an up-tempo team, and Carolina should be able to hang in there. But certainly on paper, there is still a gap between the talent on the A&M sideline and the Carolina sideline.

Kellen Mond hurt South Carolina greatly last season. Which players for the Aggies do you believe will have the biggest impact on this contest?

Other than Mond, who very clearly is going to be a major factor in this game, I'd say that running back Trayveon Williams is the one to watch. Williams has been outstanding this season with 720 rushing yards and 7 touchdowns already and he's the type of bruising back that you need to thrive on the ground in the SEC.

Add in the fact that South Carolina has struggled to stop the run -- look at the number of explosive plays that Missouri created on the ground last week -- and it's easy to see why this is the matchup to watch. Williams is almost surely going to get his yards, but the Carolina defense is going to have to make him earn it and limit his number of chunk plays. As bad as Carolina played against Kentucky, they were able to limit top back Benny Snell to an extent, so it is possible, but they'll have to fill their gaps far better than they did last week.

Texas A&M sits at 4-2 in Jimbo
Fisher's first season in College
Station, with both losses coming to
quality teams in Alabama and
Clemson. USC has yet to defeat the
Aggies since the team joined the
SEC West. USC is now 3-2 on the
season.

LAST TIME...

USC carried a 17-10 lead into the fourth quarter on the road in College Station in 2017, but could not finish the job. A&M scored 14 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to seal the win. A&M outgained USC on the ground by more than 200 yards and USC was 2-13 on third downs.

ENTERING THIS GAME...

Bentley is completing nearly 64 percent of his passes for 928 yards and 7 touchdowns, with 6 interceptions.

WHY IS HE IMPORTANT?

He touches the ball every play, and when he plays well the Gamecocks are going to have a much better chance of winning. Nobody played well against UGA, and not many against Kentucky. But Bentley's interception numbers need to improve, and he's a capable trigger man for the offense.



KEIR THOMAS

DEFENSIVE LINE

ENTERING THIS GAME...

Edwards has already matched his TD total from last season - 5- with many games remaining. He has 24 catches for 309 yards.

WHY IS HE IMPORTANT?

Every receiver is key in this game, but Edwards has been a huge big-play guy for the Gamecocks. There will be one-on-one opportunities downfield in this game and Edwards is someone USC will count on to convert.



JAYCEE HORN

ENTERING THIS GAME...

Thomas has 15 tackles, 2 tackles for loss, half a sack, and a forced fumble so far this season.

WHY IS HE IMPORTANT?

Eyes will be on many USC defenders in this contest, and there is no shortage of important figures. Yet Thomas, if he plays well, could be an unsung hero. He'll be vital to trying to create chaos in the backfield and from Kellen Mond and Trayveon Williams making plays at the second level of the defense.

ENTERING THIS GAME...

Horn has 19 tackles and a sack this season as a true freshman.

WHY IS HE IMPORTANT?

He can play cornerback or nickel and made some huge plays against Missouri that helped save the game and preserve leads for the Gamecocks. Whether it's tackling on the perimeter or covering A&M receivers, Horn is an important commodity for Muschamp's defense.

→ STOPPING THE RUN



USC has had issues stopping the run this season, and A&M's Trayveon Williams is certainly a good one who's gone over 120 yards in four games this season.

In A&M's two losses to Alabama and Clemson, Williams has been held to exactly 31 yards in each contest. QB Kellen Mond is a running threat from his position as well. The Gamecocks have to do better here.

SUCCESS IN THE AIR



A&M is stout against the run, although part of that statistical skew seems to be opposing offenses focusing on a more aerial attack. Still, they're athletic and active up front and in the front seven.

That means it could be tough for USC to run the football, and USC will have to find some big plays and ways to move chains by passing the ball.

A CLEAN GAME



A&M is a talented team, and South Carolina absolutely cannot afford to make crucial mistakes that will hinder its chances to pull a home upset here.

That means that USC has to get into the positive column with turnover margin, cannot give up big plays on special teams, and needs to avoid drive-killing (or on defense, drive-extending) penalties. A&M punter Braden Mann is one of the best in the country, so that's an angle to watch.



KEYS TO THE GAME

On paper this doesn't seem like a great matchup for South Carolina, but the folks in Vegas see the Aggies as just a 2-point favorite and the Gamecocks have managed to play A&M close the last two seasons despite a talent disadvantage. It seems cliche to always go back to the running game - on both offense and defense - but finding some running room on offense and limiting explosive run plays from A&M are clearly two of the biggest keys for South Carolina to win this game.

Defensively, it's quite simple. South Carolina has to play much better against the run. Quarterback Kellen Mond really hurt the Gamecocks extending plays with his legs and picking up key first downs in the second half of last season's game. It's running back Trayveon Williams who is perhaps a scarier proposition for USC.

He's gone over 120 yards in four games - all wins - for A&M this season. In the Aggies' two losses, he's been held to 31 yards each time. It's too much to expect the Gamecocks to limit him to that low a total, but the defense will need a good performance in not letting Williams get loose on the second level.

There's been a lot of talk about Carolina being "hardheaded" in the running game and they'll have to continue to be this week too. Being a bit more productive in that area than they were against Missouri would help too, and some more creativity will also likely be needed, but even when the running game isn't ultra successful, they're going to need to stick with it just to keep A&M honest.

RODRICUS FITTEN

What really stands out about
Fitten is his first step; he's very
quick off the ball and has natural
pass-rushing ability to go with a
big motor. In some ways, he
could end up being like current
Gamecock Bryson-Allen Williams,
who was not the biggest out of
high school in the early stages
but grew into his body and can
play multiple positions in college.
Fitten projects as a BUCK for
USC, and should bring some
strong pass-rush ability.

DEVONTAE DAVIS

USC loves Davis' game; he worked out at multiple positions at the Gamecocks' camp during the first summer Muschamp was in Columbia. The Gamecock staff was able to get him to go to junior college instead of signing with a lower-level school and now stand to reap the benefit. Davis could play inside or outside and is still learning the game. He has size, can move, is versatile, and has quick twitch athleticism.

JAHKEEM GREEN

A Sumter native, Green is a highupside defensive lineman who made an early commitment to the Gamecocks. He's still working through his academics in order to become eligible for Division I admission, but has an intriguing blend of size and talent. His former high school coach, Mark Barnes, coached Jonathan Bullard in high school and noted some similarities in their game. If he's someone who gets on campus, he could be a difference-maker.
